Her temple overlooked the Roman Forum and was situated in the exact center of Rome.

Her temple became the place where all coins were stored and distributed and also where all ledger books were stored, marking the beginnings of the temples also serving as early Mints. Geese are her sacred animal and she was considered the Protectoress of the City as she warned the citizens about an upcoming earthquake and saved many lives.

She is also associated with the Sibyl and the mysteries that follow her.
